The Crown Commercial Service (CCS) framework has been designed to help public sector organisations access demand side response (DSR) schemes without needing to run a full OJEU procurement. Organisations simply need to identify their requirements for the scheme, present these to the market and award a contract, all of which reduces timescales. The framework is simple to use, with expert procurement advice available where required.

Brian Gubb, Interim Director of Estates & Facilities at Royal United Hospital Bath, said: "We were the first NHS trust to sign up with Flexitricity for DSR. In this time we have taken part in various DSR activities, maximising the income we can generate from our onsite assets, enabling us to re-invest in our patient environment."
